
Multi-talented local doctor pens his first book



Irwin, my first question was, "How do you find the time to do all this?"

He looked at me as if to say, "it's no Who needs sleep? big deal." Shrugging his shoulders, he During a recent interview with Dr. answered, "I don't sleep much. Having

two energetic boys around doesn't allow for much down time."

"Yes," I agreed, "most people find raising two children challenging enough without adding in life and death drama at every turn.

In his book, Dr. Irwin recounts climbing expeditions to Alaska, Bolivia, Canada and Argentine Patagonia as well as local climbs of Mount Washington and Katahdin. He talks of friends made and friends lost and of alpine rescues and treating patients. With humor and with sadness, he shares his pinnacles and his frustrations as he travels through life.

He told me that he finds writing therapeutic and he credits his dad for instilling "an addiction" to penning his experiences. Dr. Irwin has been widely published in numerous magazines and journals. He proudly expects that his book will be reviewed in two of the largest climbing publications, Rock and Ice and the Mountain Gazette.

Dr. Irwin will be a guest at three local book signings in the next few weeks. He will be at Eastern Mountain Sports on Dec. 19 from 3 to 6 p.m.; at International Mountain Equipment on Dec. 30 from 4 to 7 p.m.; and at the Pinkham Notch Visitor Center, doing a signing and reading, on Jan. 9 from 6 to 8 p.m.
